

Opportunity and flexibility are the focus of the Activities Department this year. After a spring shutdown and a summer of uncertainty, our goal has been to find ways for our students to participate, compete, or engage in the activities they enjoy, with a few new protocols and procedures to keep them safe.

On the athletic side, the Northeastern Conference decided to move forward with high school fall sports and compete with conference schools only. Girls Golf and Cross Country were the first teams to practice and compete. Our Girls Golf team had the largest participation numbers we have seen in awhile. Varsity achieved their goal of making it to Sectionals as a team. Cross Country's season looked much different from previous years. The team ran in small quads against conference schools only, and Little Chute even hosted meets on our campus. The boys team tied at the Conference meet, eventually losing to perennial power Freedom in a tie-breaker. They took second place at Sub-sectionals, which was new this year, and also at Sectionals. The team placed 5th at State, with Riley Huss taking the podium with a 9th place finish at State. The girls team also had a successful season placing third in Conference and second at Sub-sectionals. Individual runner Jessica Wilson qualified for State. Boys Soccer was back in the mix this year as a JV squad. They had a very short season but the team learned a lot and the future looks bright. Volleyball grew a lot as a team this year and gave Xavier all they had in a close Regional Semi-final loss. Football finished the regular season with a record of 4-3 and are headed to the playoffs. Due to COVID, there will be no State for football, rather they will play the first two levels only. Middle School athletes also got to compete this fall. Both Cross Country and Volleyball had opportunities to play against Valley-Bay Conference Schools. Middle School Boys Basketball is about halfway through their season.

On the activities side, many of our clubs and organizations are in full swing. Although many of their meetings are held virtually, our wonderful advisors are giving the students an opportunity to get involved in another community outside of school where they can work on their leadership skills and focus on their talents and creativity. Many of our competition-based organizations will compete virtually this year.

Extracurriculars are an invaluable part of the educational experience, and we are proud to be giving our students opportunities.

Getting Creative with Flexcursions

Flexcursions are a favorite component of Flex Academy. These monthly events are meant to provide an experience out in the community, which extends learning beyond the classroom. In years past, community sites such as EAA Museum, State Capitol Building, and Mulberry Farm allowed for in-action learning through school-wide field trips.

This year Flex Academy had to be creative since our district practices have followed such safety measures as eliminating field trips in order to decrease intermingling of students and gathering in large groups as one way to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. However, through a strong partnership with Fallen Timbers, the Flexcursions are still part of our programming. Fallen Timbers Environmental Center is located near Seymour, WI. It is owned by a consortium of six school districts (which includes the Little Chute Area School District) and is operated by CESA 6. Flex staff has worked closely with Fallen Timbers Director Matt Gottfredsen and project coordinator Jarrod Folkman to bring Flexcursions to the Flex Academy. In October, the students and staff were led through learning experiences focused on living and nonliving ecosystems, and weather stations. The team from Fallen Timbers also provides virtual options for our families who have chosen the virtual platform. We are so thankful for this great partnership, and we look forward to future events.

2020 District Tax Levy



At the October 26, 2020, meeting, the School Board certified the tax levy for the 2020-21 school year. The district is pleased to report a decrease in the mill rate for the third year in a row.

Basic Facts about School District Taxes and Levy Rates (source: dpi.wi.gov)

School district property taxes include levies for general operations, debt service, capital expansion and community services. Property values are equalized to reflect market value rather than local assessed value. The equalized levy rate is the total property tax levy divided by the current year equalized property value with tax incremental financing (TIF) values excluded. Levy rates are shown in "mills" or property tax dollars levied per \$1,000 of equalized property value.



How Does This Impact My Property Tax Bill?

Below is an example of a 2019 tax bill with some information about how to calculate the impact of the school district mill rate in addition to highlighting other factors that have an impact on your taxes.



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In order to be good stewards of taxpayer funds, a cost-effective bulk mailing service was used for this publication. Board of Education Spring Election

LCASD Board of Education has two open seats for the Spring Election, each for a term of office of three years (2021-2024).

Electors wishing to become candidates for School Board Member at the election to be held on Tuesday, April 6, 2021, must file a Campaign Registration Statement and a Declaration of Candidacy with Karmen Hopfensperger in the office of the School District Clerk, 1402 Freedom Rd., Little Chute, WI, no later than 5:00 pm on Tuesday, January 5, 2021. Forms for making such declarations can be obtained from the Office of the District Administrator, 1402 Freedom Rd., Little Chute, WI, during normal office hours of 8:00 am and 4:00 pm, Monday through Friday.
