What a whirlwind 10 years can be? My first two years in high school I worked extremely hard on my schooling, and was able to finish most of my high school required classes. ## **WHERE ARE THEY NOW?**

Our first "Where Are They Now?" feature student is Hannah Rambo. Hannah graduated from LCCPA in 2016. She is currently finishing up her Bachelor of Science in Education at UW Oshkosh after two years at UW Stevens Point. After graduation in May, Hannah will be pursuing a position as an elementary school teacher with the possibility of attending graduate school to become a Reading Specialist. Hannah is a perfect example of a student that charted her own course while at LCCPA. While she started out in the Health Science pathway, she found out through her coursework and career exploration that her passion lies in education. We asked Hannah to reflect on her journey from LCCPA to pursuing the career of her dreams.

#### What advice would you give current LCCPA students about being prepared for a college education?

My biggest piece of advice to current students is to start thinking right away about what you want to do after high school. I spent a ton of time looking into different careers and job shadowing, and I still wasn't sure what I wanted to do when I graduated. It's so hard to make that decision at such a young age! If LCCPA hadn't pushed me to figure out what I wanted to do, I have no idea where I would be right now. I might've ended up in teaching, but I think it would've taken me much longer to figure it out!

### How does the career you are working in/pursuing now compare to the career you THOUGHT you would be working in/pursuing when you left LCCPA?

To be completely honest, the career I am pursuing now is not what I thought I would be doing when I graduated from LCCPA. I had been part of the health pathway, so at the time that I graduated, I was planning to attend Carroll University and become a nurse practitioner. The summer before I left for college, I realized that my heart was not set on nursing. I was interested in healthcare, and I definitely wanted to work with children. I decided to pursue speech language pathology at UW Stevens Point instead. For two years I took speech classes and was on track to graduate. I remember thinking that I was content with what I was doing, but I didn't love speech as much as most of my classmates did. Eventually, I was required to take an education course so that I could work in a school as an SLP. I absolutely loved it. I also became a tutor for a local 9th grade student, and I couldn't stop thinking about how motivated I was by teaching. At the end of my sophomore year, I made the decision to become a teacher. Looking back, although teaching seems very different from nursing, I always knew that I wanted to make a difference in the lives of children. Both careers would have allowed me to do that, but education is just a better fit for me.

#### What advice would you give to our current students regarding their career journey?

My advice to current students is to think early and often about what you want to do after high school. It's also important to really reflect on what you enjoy doing and try to figure out if there is a career that fits with your interests. The career focused pathways at LCCPA are super helpful, but don't be afraid to keep your mind open to other possibilities. This might seem like common sense, but when you are job shadowing it's important to picture yourself actually doing that career when deciding if you would like it or not. No matter what the career is, observing will never be as enjoyable as actually doing it.

### Are there any particular partners/people/events that made a big impact on helping you become the person you are today?

My LCCPA teachers! It think they really emphasized the importance of finding a career that makes you happy. If I had not taken that seriously, I would be nowhere near where I am today. I also had so much support from family and friends, and it was helpful to get their advice throughout the whole process. In hindsight, it's so easy to see that teaching is where I should have ended up all along. I have always loved school and learning, and teaching is a way for me to continue doing those things. I am thankful for all the partners and professionals who spoke with us and allowed us to shadow them. Even if it was crossing something off my list, they helped me to continue taking steps in the right direction!

## Given your experience since graduating from LCCPA, what do you see as the most important 21st-Century Skills to be successful in college and career?

It's hard to pick skills that are most important, because all the 21st century skills that we learned about have been helpful to me in some way. Given what's happening in education right now, it's been super important for me to have the technological skills necessary to teach in a virtual format. LCCPA exposed me to the different ways that technology can be used in a professional setting, and my knowledge of technology has continued to grow throughout college. In terms of self-directed learning, when you are in college, you don't have someone checking up your productivity all the time. It was very helpful to start college having experience with self-directed learning. These skills help me to stay organized and on top of my responsibilities in college, and they will continue to be important in my career as a teacher.
