## Educational Enrichment Fund Supports Innovative Learning



Thanks to the Little Chute Area School District Educational Enrichment Fund, the district is able to make learning projects possible with the generous help of individuals and businesses. The district's operating budget is limited and can not support every innovative idea that our teachers, administrators, and support staff have to enrich our students' learning. Established with support from local business Crystal Print, Inc., the grant program provides private funding for scholarships, innovative projects, and creative programs not included in the operating budget.

This past spring, representatives from our Building Leadership Teams joined district administrators to review applications submitted by teachers and award grant money based on specific
criteria that must be met. There were three staff members who were awarded money for their projects.

Rudy Botz, Associate Principal of the Elementary School, and the Behavior Committee were awarded online licenses for Conscious Discipline training modules. This platform will allow the team to explore the resources and strategies related to school culture and behavior. The committee will bring forward ideas throughout the year and an implementation plan in the spring if they decide to move forward.

Angela Wachtel, Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment, and the Culturally Responsive Committee were awarded funds to allow all staff and Board of Education members to take
part in professional learning through book clubs. The book clubs will meet six hours during our early release times and read their choice of selected books and learn from one another through discussions and application of their learning.

Andy Kratzke, first-grade teacher, and his team were awarded funds to bring in Author/Illustrator Rick Chrustowski. Chrustowski will present to each class, as well as the whole grade, and share his process of creating and publishing books.

## Summer Professional Learning

Professional Learning is one of our core areas of our Blueprint for Brilliance. Over the summer, LCASD staff learn and grow to better serve our students. Many teachers spent time preparing for new courses, updating curriculum, and collaborating with teams. Since we are committed to Professional Learning Communities, this year we sent teams from each school to attend the Professional Learning Community Institute in Lincolnshire, IL. They were part of the planning for professional learning and activities for staff to support our commitment to working together to ensure high levels of learning for every student.

## School Highlight: Summer Upgrades

Over this past summer, the Buildings and Grounds Team was hard at work making some significant upgrades.


At the 5-12 complex grounds, we swapped out our irrigation control system with a "smart" controller that allows the system to automatically adjust watering duration based on real-time weather data. Even though it took us a couple of months to calibrate it, preliminary numbers indicate that we have reduced our water consumption by 100,000 gallons in August alone.

Inside our 5-12 complex, we finalized our audio/video upgrade in the auditorium which allows for a better experience for both the presenters and audience. The Field House lights received an upgrade to L.E.D. panels for more control and better efficiency. Our summer also included painting spaces on rotation and general maintenance to keep our facility inviting.

The Elementary school front office and work room, including principals and
 health offices, were renovated to be more efficient and cohesive. The photos are the before, during, and completed images of the office. In addition to the renovation, we also replaced two boilers that were original to the building in 1991. The new boilers allow for a $16 \%$ upgrade in gas efficiency, as well as full modulation and better control.


## Board Spotlight

Our Board of Education (BOE) governs the policies and the resources of our district, as well as supervises and evaluates the District Administrator.

The meetings, which are held on the second and fourth Monday of each month, consist of building and department reports, financial and facilities updates, and action items.

» If you have a Bachelor's or Associate's degree but do not hold a teaching license/degree, CESA 6 offers training that allows the applicant to obtain a substitute teaching certificate through DPI
- Apply for an Educator License on the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) OR
- Enrolled in an educator preparation program approved by the state
