However, thanks to the Little Chute Area School District Educational Enrichment Fund, the district is able to make learning projects possible with the generous help of individuals and businesses. Established with support from local business Crystal Print, Inc., the grant program provides private funding of scholarships, innovative projects and creative programs not included in

the operating budget.

Each spring a representative group from our district reviews applications submitted by teachers and awards grant money based on specific criteria that must be met. New Book Vending Machine Sparks Interest in Reading

Last spring a friend reached out to me about an innovative machine her school had added, a book vending machine. Seeing this sparked my interest as I have a LOVE for reading. I looked into how it worked and all the benefits other schools have had when using this tool in their school. Not only does it promote a love for literacy for kids, but it also makes reading accessible at home for our students who may not always have access to quality books. Students also feel celebrated when they get to pick a free book on their birthday! Teachers reported good conversations in

their classrooms about real-life skills such as handling coins (or in this

case tokens), buying something and making a choice that is right for them.

I couldn't wait to bring this idea to our administration. From there, I was pointed toward the Educational Enrichment Grants our school offers, and I was pleased to hear that this was going to happen for our elementary school. I purchased books to fill the Bookworm vending machine using some of the grant money and the rest paid for the machine. This machine has been up and running since the beginning of October with books in a variety of age levels, interests and genres.



LCASD Goes Global: Global Read Aloud 2022

In 2010, Wisconsin educator Pernille Ripp launched an idea: connect the world through reading a book together, a global read aloud. Since then, the idea has grown to include millions of students across over 80 countries. Instead of one book, several books are selected to ensure each age level has a book that is a good fit. This year, the Little Chute Area School District has the opportunity to participate in this event thanks to the LCASD Educational Enrichment Grant.

By participating in Global Read Aloud, teachers will be able to connect with other classrooms, hear from authors and illustrators, and enjoy the power of storytelling and how it connects us. Students will get to be immersed in the beauty of language and story, increasing their ability to think critically about what they read. Books were distributed to teachers the week of September 19, and the event officially kicked off October 4. Teachers have flexibility in how they choose to participate, and are being provided with materials and resources to support reading the selected book with their classes. We are so excited to be able to increase our students' global connectedness, help them become artistic appreciators, and grow their abilities as effective communicators.

Alumnus Launches Athlete Leadership Training



Little Chute High School student athletes are getting world-renowned leadership training that not many other high schools experience, thanks to Jeff Janssen, a 1987 graduate of LCHS. An author, trainer and motivator, Janssen and his Sports Leadership Center have trained college and high school athletes and coaches nationwide. Last summer he brought his expertise back to Little Chute, by training Activities Director Kelly Wallace and Boys Basketball Coach Jake VanRoy. He helped launch the Little Chute **Lari DeBruin Leadership Academy (LDLA)**, named after Janssen's eighth-grade football coach Lari DeBruin.

Wallace and VanRoy are running two student leadership groups - one for senior athletes and another for sophomores through seniors who are emerging leaders. The veteran group is focusing on how to vocally lead an entire team

and the emerging group is focusing on leading themselves so that they can eventually become vocal leaders. Students are meeting once a month before school for the training, which hopefully will translate not only to greater athletic success but also lifelong leadership skills they can use in their personal and professional lives. LCASD STUDENT COUNT DATA

TOTAL ENROLLMENT

1580 - The total number of students enrolled as of the 3rd Friday in September (the annual DPI required count date).





OPEN ENROLLMENT

Of our 1580 students, 515 of them open enroll into Little Chute from another school district. That's 33% of our student population!

RESIDENT STUDENTS

1065 of our 1580 students are residentsstudents who live in Little Chute. We also have 149 residents who choose to attend another public school district. This is a total of 1214 resident students.



BUDGET IMPACT

The biggest factor in our annual budget is the number of resident students. It is the basis for the revenue limit calculation (the amount of revenue the district can raise through state aid and property taxes). The 3 year average of resident students (members) is multiplied by an amount per member as set by the state of Wisconsin. A different (lower) amount of dollars is transferred between districts for each open enrollment student. Considering our open enrollment population, this is also a significant budget factor for Little Chute.
