Jon Larson is the Technology, Manufacturing, and Engineering Teacher as well as the Skills USA Advisor at the LCCPA. Among the courses he teaches are: Metals Courses (welding/machining), Foundations of Manufacturing and Engineering, PLTW Engineering, Intro to Engineering Design, Principles of Engineering, and 8th Grade Tech Ed.

Everyday, Mr. Larson works hard to provide students with opportunities to learn, develop skills, or prepare them for future careers. For example, on Wednesday October 26th, he had the opportunity to take 40 sophomores to the Northeast Wisconsin Manufacturing First Expo to provide a unique experience interacting with business partners.

Some of his other proud achievements include:

- Building bridges between the Little Chute school district and community business leaders as well as the Fox Valley Technical College for students to earn credit.
- Received recognition in the spring of 2022 for Northeast Wisconsin Manufacturing Alliance (NEWMA) Career Pathmaker Tech Ed Teacher Award.
- Development and expansion of the Skills USA, Youth Apprenticeship, and Project Lead the Way Programs to give students opportunities and serve as a model for other schools.
- Two-time Herb Kohl Teacher Fellowship Nominee

Mr. Larson's teaching philosophy is guided in equal parts by a) providing students opportunities to grow and learn skills that will help them advance their careers; and b) protecting students' right to learn safely, and c) encouraging students to take healthy risks. By combining these three values, he has become highly respected amongst his students and peers by working tirelessly to create opportunities for students, giving them the skills to succeed, and encouraging them to take full advantage of their chances. He's particularly proud of Ryan DeGroot, Abby Robbins, and Cory Hudziak, who he says have been consistent top performers in tech ed and their Youth Apprenticeships.

In addition to his teaching responsibilities, Mr. Larson serves on the Homecoming Committee and helps build sets for the theater department. When he's not a teacher, Jon enjoys hunting, fishing, spending time up north, building projects, and of course, spending time with his wife and children.

#### **CAREER EXPERIENCES**

HEARTLAND BUSINESS SERVICES

On Monday, October 17, the Computer Science Essentials class went to Heartland Business Services for the first-ever computer science pathway career experience. HBS is a company that helps other companies with websites or other technical issues. Some of the services that they provide are securing backups of other companies' data, developing software solutions, and meeting with their customers about their IT infrastructure.



To begin our visit, the College Recruiter Abby Vandenberg gave us some background information about HBS. We learned about the background of HBS, including the company's history, office locations, and customers. We also learned about their core values: Performance, Respect, Innovation, Development, and Excellence (PRIDE). Abby also talked about how having a good LinkedIn profile is important for finding a job in IT. After this initial information, Abby gave us a tour of the building. One of the highlights of the tour was learning about their data center. There, we learned about the servers that HBS uses to store their customer's data as well as how they keep this data secure. After our tour, we went back to the meeting room to learn about IT careers from four different HBS employees.

During our meeting, we learned about a number of different career opportunities in Computer Science and Information Technology. For example, we learned about software and web application development as well as network engineering. In addition to learning about careers, our hosts also gave us advice about important soft skills required to be successful in computer-related careers. Some of these skills include time management, working and communicating with others, keeping your cool in uncomfortable situations, keeping your ego in check, and most importantly problem-solving. We also learned about the education required to enter computer science careers. While a four-year college is important to have, you can get a career in computer science with a two-year degree or even on-the-job training.

Overall, our experience at HBS was well worth our time. We got to learn the core values of what it means to be a Software Engineer and IT Specialist. We would like to thank our hosts at HBS for taking the time out of their day to help us learn more about what being an IT professional in the real world is all about.

Logan Maass is currently a Senior in the Medical Pathway of the Little Chute Career Pathways Academy. She has been active in Volleyball, National Honor Society, LCCPR, Forensics, and other activities throughout her four years and has served as a leader amongst her peers in both her academics and character.

Logan's post-secondary goals center around going into Speech Pathology so she can help students with speech disorders communicate effectively. She grew interested in this field through her work as a teacher aid in the Special Education department and found that she loved working with special needs students. She is inspired by the individuals she works with because of their optimism and describes them as loving and full of joy.

Some of the LCCPA experiences Logan feels helped shape her were Mr. Volk's seminars for putting her miles ahead in her skills and confidence with presentations, interviews, and talking with professionals.



She's also grown a lot from the real-world experiences LCCPA has offered and learning to overcome the struggles of the work-at-your-own-pace model. She cites Mr. Choudoir specifically as inspiring her to be her best. She appreciates Mr. Choudoir for pushing her to be her best, to go out for the career experiences, and is always willing to go the extra mile for his students. Logan cites these as helping her learn her most important lessons in life, including that hard work is its own reward.

Abbie Botz, LCCPA Alum, is currently a Physician's Assistant in the Trauma & Acute Care Surgery at St. Mary's Hospital in Madison, WI. This line of work has her assisting in surgery, seeing patients in the hospital, and conducting post-operative/wound care check-ups with them in the clinic. She enjoys that every day is different and working directly with/caring for patients, but acknowledges a tough part of her job is always being prepared for whatever emergency that comes through the door.

Her biggest challenge on the job so far has been the learning curve, having only started just over a month ago. However, she's making the most of it by soaking up all the information she can. Some of her highlights include treating a wide variety of medical conditions, assisting in life-saving surgeries, and getting the chance to hear the gratitude from her patients.

Abbie has endured a long and difficult road to reach her career goals. After graduating from the LCCPA in 2015, she faced extensive post-secondary education; she earned her Bachelor's of Exercise Science and Master's of Kinesiology at Michigan Tech, then went to Physician's Assistant school at UW-Madison, graduating in the spring of 2022.



In reflecting on her time in the LCCPA and how it has shaped her today, Abbie said that the curriculum allowed her to work at her own pace and fully immerse herself into interesting topics. She also credits her training in the 21st century skills that helped make her undergraduate and graduate studies (as well as her current career) easier. Lastly, she cites the support of the faculty and being pushed to be her best every day as one of her more significant experiences in the LCCPA.

When asked if she had any advice for current LCCPA students, she emphasized how important it is to keep an open mind, even when something doesn't seem a good fit. She said, "You never know when an opportunity is going to come along that will change your mind and impact your life."

Outside of medicine, Abbie enjoys reading, exercising, baking, up north, and of course, spending time with family and friends.



#### Resume/Application Tips:

- When applying for a job, college, scholarship, or just given the opportunity to boast of your achievements, do so in a way that shows you take ownership of your achievements. By doing so, you come across as more authoritative and action/results motivated which is appealing to people reviewing your resume or application. To do this, consider the following:
  - Organize your writing by starting with your WHY (your beliefs or values), then discuss how that informs your HOW (your process/what you do), and conclude by discussing your WHAT (the outcome and how it connect with your "why").
  - Use active voice when writing; avoid using helping verbs to talk about what you've done.
  - Use concrete examples of times you've succeeded or overcome challenges.
  - When describing a challenge or a failure, always end by talking about what you've learned or how you're getting better.
  - When describing teamwork, never discount the work of others, but focus on your role/contributions.
